

## DISTRIBUTION OF RE-USABLE PADS TO GIRL CHILD IN SCHOOL PROJECT

START DATE : 27<sup>TH</sup>MAY 2022

REPORT DATE :  $7^{TH}$  JUNE 2022

#### **Background**

- This project is aimed at keeping girls in schools during menstruation period.
- Also to help equip girls and ladies of the community with skills on how to make these re-usable pads.
- Thirdly, to promote menstrual Hygiene for girls in rural schools specifically Kyamulibwa Village.
- The project was implemented in 4 schools in Kyamulibwa village by KAP members on the 27<sup>th</sup> May
- 2022.
- Trainers were searched and obtained from a community which had benefited from a similar project by another organization.
- 800 re-usable pads were given to 200 students. Each pack contains 4 re-usable pads and these benefited 50 students from each school.

### How the project was implemented

Schools were identified by KAP members living in Kyamulibwa Village.

- Meetings with schools` administrations were held and the project was well received by all the schools.
- Letters confirming the date of execution were sent to the schools on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2022.
- Trainers were also contacted to confirm their availability on the scheduled day.
- The order for 800 re-usable pads (200 packs) was placed on 14<sup>th</sup> April 2022.
- The re-usable pads were picked and transported from Kampala to kyamulibwa on  $27^{\mbox{th}}$  May 2022.
- Students were organized and training sessions were conducted by the trainers in the four schools.
- Re-usable pads were distributed to girls in four schools in Kyamulibwa Village, 2 primary and 2 secondary schools. And these are; St. Benedict primary school, Kabungo Primary school, Kyamulibwa Holy family Secondary school and Greenhill secondary school.
- 800 re-usable pads were given to 200 students. Each pack contains 4 re-usable pads and these benefited 50 students from each school.
- 3 community ladies were trained how to make and Maintain menstrual Hygiene.
- Reduction of abscentism from school by girls during menstruation period.
- Promotion of menstrual hygiene in girls.
- Reduction on monthly home expenses on pads by parents.
- Acquisition of skills by both girls and ladies of the community on how to make re-usable pads

#### **Conclusion and Recommendation**

- The Project was much appreciated by the girls and schools staff in all schools.
- The skills acquired will enable the girls to make their own re-usable pads to add on what was given to them.
- Menstruation Hygiene is and remains a useful topic to adolescent students especially those in rural setup.
- However, the sessions were short and the trainers and training materials were few. For sustainability there is still need for more sessions and materials. A well-equipped workshop in the community can be a possible solution.
- Out of over 600 students trained, only 200 students and 2 ladies received packs of re-usable pads, we recommend more funding for more re-usable pads. This will help to reach out to other schools and community ladies.
- One school administrator suggested and recommended an outreach project for boy child who has been neglected in the recent years.
